## Journey to Sanctuary

Last week in school, we hosted a special exhibition from Lee House Exhibitions called 'Journey to Sanctuary'. It is a sensory walk through a series of 8 small rooms telling the story of a refugee's journey using visuals, projectors and lights as well as headsets that talk the pupils through what is happening.

The story starts off with them at home, then war breaking out and fleeing to a refugee camp. They then encounter people smugglers and pay someone to get them to safety. Travelling in the back of a truck in total darkness they then find themselves at immigration, prison and eventually adjusting to life in a strange country without their family.

Pupils went through the exhibition in small groups during RE lessons then were invited to write a message of hope for refugees on the postcards provided by CAFOD.

The feedback from pupils has been amazing with many commenting on how moving and sad the story was. For some, it is the first time they have thought about the story behind the newspaper headlines and we hope it has stimulated a sense of empathy and has deepened pupils' understanding of the real plight of refugees across the world.

The Cakes and Classics book club met on Thursday to discuss *Pride and Prejudice* by Jane Austen. It was great to discuss the text and enjoy some lovely homemade cakes (especially Leah's marvellous creations - Jaffa Cake cupcakes!).
